Dear Friends,

“Stop the world I want to get off!” – a heartfelt cry that can be found on the lips of all of us from time to time as life seems to be getting busier and busier. Far from providing the utopian future of ‘time saving machines’ and ‘paperless offices’ technology and IT seem rather to have created even more pressure with instant messaging, emails and texts; while mobile phones mean that even on holiday there is no escape from the cares and toils of the modern world. Which is not say that technology has not made much of modern life easier and healthier but it is the abiding weakness of humanity that inextricably mixed into the benefits we always manage to find ourselves embroiled in the negative effects which can so often drag us down in a spiral of ‘busyness.’ And it so often seems that even our leisure time is crammed full of activities and ‘things to do and see’!

That's not the biblical view however. It's interesting to note that in the first Genesis account of creation [Genesis 1 – 2.3] the first thing God created after creating humankind was a Sabbath rest! And it's notable that a Sabbath rest was included in the Ten Commandments [Exodus 20. 8-11]. While the Book of Leviticus legislates for the land to be included and commands that ever seven years the land should rest [Leviticus 25, 1-7]. Clearly God would heartily endorse the old saying “All work and no play makes a Jack (and Jill) a dull boy (and girl)! And while teaching that the Sabbath was made for humankind and not humankind for the Sabbath [Mark 2,25], Jesus also made sure that he and his disciples took time to rest [e.g. Mark 6, 31].

St Benedict was concerned that his monks lived a balance life and included in his Rule times of rest, meditation, worship and work. And even modern psychology is convinced that for human beings to be both physically and mentally healthy then we all need times of rest and refreshment. Without times of rest and refreshment our physical, mental and spiritual life becomes dry, anxious and depressing.

Now we can't replicated Joshua's miracle and make the sun stand still [Joshua 10, 12-13] it is possible to explore the idea of some “Sabbath” down time; and during 2015 there will be a monthly opportunity to do that on every second Tuesday of the month at Balderstone Church. Sister Judith and I will be organising a monthly Silent Space Day, and opportunity to “get off the world” for a while – well actually from 10.00am -3.00pm. Beginning with a short reflection the day is then open to you to do as you please: pray, meditate, read, go for a walk, even sleep if you want to and closes with a short act of worship! No need to book, just turn up with your sandwiches! We'll provide tea, coffee and biscuits and we're asking for a suggested donation of £3.00 for the day to cover costs. Each day is stand-alone so you don't have to make a monthly commitment just come when you can.

So why not book a little ‘Sabbath rest’ into the diary and come along “to a quiet place...and rest awhile.”

Mellor St. Mary C. E. Primary School News

The Autumn Term 2014 will always be remembered for our two very successful SIAMS

and OFSTED Inspections and copies of both reports are available on the school website. All the children's Christmas activities carried on throughout this time and I must thank pupils, staff, parents and governors for their extra outstanding support, hard work and commitment.

Below is a summary of the findings of the Inspection team:

This is a good school.

n Pupils make at least good progress in all classes throughout the school. By the end of Year 6, they achieve standards in reading, writing and mathematics that are well above average.

n Teaching is always at least good. Staff know pupils well and have high expectations. They plan work that stimulates and engages pupils in their learning.

n Each pupils' progress is carefully checked and any slower progress is quickly and effectively addressed.

n Teachers and teaching assistants work well together to support the learning of disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils so that they make good progress.

n Children get a good start to their learning in the Reception class.

n Pupils' behaviour in lessons and around the school is outstanding. Pupils have excellent attitudes to learning and are very proud of their school. They get on extremely well with one another, and there are excellent relationships between pupils and staff.

n Pupils feel completely safe in school, and are cared for very well. They say that bullying is extremely rare and that currently there is none in their school.

n The curriculum is varied and well balanced, and engages pupils very effectively in their learning. There is a wide range of enrichment activities.

n Pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is excellent. Pupils are very well prepared for life in modern Britain.

n The school is well led and managed. School leaders, including governors, have a clear view of how well the school is performing and where it can do better. They have worked well together to improve the quality of teaching and raise pupils' achievement.

n Parents are very appreciative and strongly supportive of the school.

It is not yet an outstanding school because

n Expectations of what pupils can achieve are not always high enough, particularly for the most able. They are not always given work that is hard enough to enable them to make the best possible progress and reach the highest standards.

n There are limited opportunities for staff to improve their own practice, for example, by observing outstanding practitioners.

The inspector observed lessons taught by eight teachers, including one observed jointly

with the headteacher. The inspector also visited a school assembly.

n Meetings were held with the headteacher, the early years coordinator, the special educational needs coordinator and with five governors, including the Chair and vice-chair of the Governing Body. The inspector also spoke to a representative from the local authority.

n The inspector met a group of pupils to discuss their views of the school and spoke informally to other pupils in lessons and during break and lunchtimes.

n The inspector looked at the work pupils were doing in lessons and in their books over time. He listened to pupils read and talked to them about their enjoyment of reading.

n The inspector observed the work of the school and examined a number of documents. These included data concerning pupils' current achievement, development plans and arrangements to check the performance of staff.

The inspector also looked at records relating to behaviour, attendance and safeguarding. Minutes of governing body meetings and the school adviser's reports were also considered.

n The inspector took account of 29 responses to the online Parent View questionnaire. He also considered 13 responses to the questionnaires completed by staff for the inspection.

Children, staff and governors are very pleased with the findings of the Ofsted Inspection and feel that it reflects their self-evaluation of the school of which we are all so proud.

School closes for half-term on Friday, 13th February and re-opens on Monday, 23rd February.

To contact the police there are several numbers.

For emergencies call 999
For less urgent instances call 101
To leave a message for any of the Neighbourhood Police Team,
call 01200 458766.
Please note that messages are only checked during office hours.

When should I use 101?

You should call 101 to report crime and other concerns
that do not require an emergency response.

For example, if:

- Your car has been stolen
- Your property has been damaged
- You suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood

Or to:

- Report a minor traffic collision
- Give the police information about crime in your area
- Speak to the police about a general enquiry

You should always call 999 when it is an emergency, such as when a crime is in progress, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

What about nuisance or environmental issues?

You should contact your local council about general issues in your area like:

- Dog fouling
- Abandoned vehicles
- Dumping and fly tipping
- Vandalism of public property

Botshabelo Orphanage in Johannesburg

During my recent stay in Johannesburg I was privileged to visit the Babies' Centre at Botshabelo Orphanage.

There were 14 babies ranging in age from 2 weeks to 2 years 3 months all being looked after by two young African women. Three newly born babies had been brought in during the Christmas period - all unwanted and given for adoption.

Nine of the babies were lying together on a blanket outside in the shade whilst the 'mums' were feeding them with bottles of formula - of course, I was soon down amongst them! It was wonderful to cuddle the babies and gaze at their beautiful faces but at the same time feel an overwhelming sadness. However, these little ones were the lucky ones as they were cared for, clean and well fed as they waited for someone to adopt them. It was explained to me that the children could go to Europe, Scandinavia - anywhere in the world - except USA and UK - which means that Madonna can't have one . . .and neither can I !

The purpose of my visit was to deliver items of clothing made by Joan Hak - intended for the children at Montgomery Heights in Zimbabwe (the place I visited last year), but as a visit wasn't possible this year - Botshabelo benefited. Also, a donation of cash given by two kind friends in Mellor was gratefully received as well as fruit and treats. Thank you! - - - Please see email below!

Unfortunately, but understandingly, I was not allowed to take any photographs of the children but I treasure the memories of their smiling faces and the few hours I spent with African 'Little Angels'.
