My dear friends,

What a lovely feeling it is to know that this will be my last magazine letter that I have to write which I have done for the last 18 months. It is good to be able to hand over the job to Sue as she becomes your new Parish Priest from March 12th.

This month leads us through Lent and the Passion to Easter, but, there are some very important dates on the way, and I would like to devote my letter to one of them namely March 17th the FEAST of ST PATRICK. a favourite of mine. (one of many) and maybe a saint with a message for Sue and her ministry with you.

'Jesus said, See I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of the wolves; so be as wise as serpents and innocent as doves.' MATTHEW 10:16

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland, yet he was born in England. Many of the lives of the old saints come from all sorts of legends some believable some less so. Patricks `Confessions` and `The Letter to Coroticus` are unique in the history of the early Celtic church. They tell in his own words the history of his life as a missionary. He was born somewhere in western England in the fourth century AD, in a Christian family and when about seventeen was kidnapped by slave-traders and taken to Ireland and sold as a cattle-hand. Yet he loved his rough Irish masters, and longed to share with them the Christian faith that he had learnt at home, and of which they knew nothing.

Patrick escaped from Ireland to France where he trained for the priesthood and was ordained. He then took the courageous step to travel back to Ireland as a missionary. There he suffered much opposition, and felt that he was sent by Christ `like a sheep into the midst of wolves.` Patrick wasnt stupid, he knew exactly what he was up against. But he refused to use trickery to gain his own way, and slowly but surely he won supporters with his charm. Christian missionaries often have to be `wise as serpents and harmless as doves`.

There are some countries today where Christians receive violent opposition for their faith. In most of these, the overseas missionary is not involved in direct evangelism, but in supporting the local Christians in more practical ways, in medicine, agriculture, education and new technology. Any Christian who leaves his or her home to help the Church in another country is a missionary. Jesus knew all about the dangers when a single wolf enters a flock of sheep, so there was a striking ironic humour in his warning that his followers were to go out like a single sheep into a flock of wolves!

Most of us will never meet violent persecution for our faith; we are more likely to be, dismissed as irrelevant to modern life, and mocked openly or behind our backs for our stupidity in sticking to such an old-fashioned set of beliefs. We must not underestimate the strength of this opposition that is about us today; we must be as wise as serpents. Yet we are still called to be missionaries.

It is all too easy to shrink into a purely private faith, which we never mention in public so as to avoid being made fun of. Jesus will not allow us to do this, but sends each one of us out as sheep among wolves to bear witness to our faith, and to share the love of God with those who may never have heard that God love them. Yet we shall fail if we become aggressive, nobody wins converts that way; we have to win people by our gentleness and charm, as Patrick did in Ireland.

May I take this opportunity to wish Gods blessing on Sue as she begins her ministry in the United Benefice of Mellor, Balderstone and Samlesbury and also to wish everyone a Happy and Blessed Easter.

Building Repairs

The scaffolding which was erected in church during December has been removed following further inspection visits by the architects and several contractors. A report has been sent to the Diocesan Advisory Committee by the architects setting out the problems and suggesting how these would be put right. This report was reviewed at the committee's February meeting and permission was given to proceed with the repairs under an emergency repair scheme. The architect is issuing tender documents for the repair to the contractors who inspected the damage and is requesting replies before the end of February. Once these have been reviewed by the PCC and a contractor chosen, it is hoped to start work as soon as possible. This will require scaffolding to be erected again but hopefully we can work around it without too much disruption to our services.

Mellor St. Mary C. E. Primary School

In February 2013, the school received an interim report from Ofsted. The main findings of the report are:

"As you may know, during its last inspection in April 2010, Ofsted inspectors judged your child's school to be good. Schools which are performing well are now inspected less often than other schools. This usually means that good schools are inspected once in five years, whilst schools that require improvement will be inspected between 12 to 24 months after their last inspection.

In carrying out the interim assessment, we considered the following:

- pupils' attainment, including the attainment of significant groups of pupils
- focus on disabled pupils and those who have special educational needs and pupils' attainment in core subjects
- pupils' progress, including the progress made by different groups of pupils
- pupils' attendance
- any inspection visits carried out by Ofsted since the last routine inspection

I am pleased to inform you that our interim assessment shows that the school's performance has been sustained and that we can defer its next full inspection."

This interim report was discussed at the Spring Term Governors' Meeting and everyone was pleased with its findings.

Dear Friends

Let me begin by introducing myself, for even though I have had the pleasure and privilege of worshipping with you from time to time that has been, of necessity as a visitor rather than as a member of the parish. Perhaps a good place to start would be to begin by explaining why my title is 'Amma'. I am a religious sister and one of two founder members of a rather new and small religious community, the Order of the Companions of Martha and Mary, and at the moment I serve as the superior of the Order. Before we were founded we decided that in response to our respect for the spirituality of the Desert Mothers and Fathers, the superior of our Order should be given the title Amma which is the Arabic word for 'mother' and a tile given to the female spiritual leaders of the desert communities of monks and nuns at the beginning of the Christian Church. As we are so small and new we do not have our own community house and so the other founding sister of the Order, Sister Judith, will be sharing community life with me at the Vicarage. Sister Judith is the Blackburn Diocese Course Director for the Called to Serve course and is the Reader at Christ the King in Blackburn.

Being born and spending my early life in Liverpool I am a 'scouser' (and very proud to be so) and although I've also lived in a variety of other places around the country I was privileged to be ordained in Liverpool Cathedral and served my curacy in the parish of Prescot, about 7 or 8 miles outside the city centre. My family live close by with my parents and my sister and her family living in Wigan and my brother and his family live in Lancaster; my sister has two children and three grandchildren and my brother has a teenage son. I also have an 'honorary' family (long story) who live in Oxfordshire and Canada and so I have an 'honorary' daughter and son-in-law and 4 'honorary' grandchildren and 2 'honorary' great-grandchildren. Before I begin to sound as old as Methuselah I should mention that my sister and my honorary daughter were married very young and had their children early! As all my family and I are very close I'm sure that eventually you will have the opportunity to meet the individual members of it when they visit at the vicarage from time to time.

As you read this article we shall be drawing ever closer the beginning of the life of the new United Benefice of Balderstone, Mellor and Samlesbury and my Institution as your new Vicar; which is both an exciting and at the same time a daunting prospect for us all!

It's exciting as we look forward to travelling together on this new venture as we begin to work as a United Benefice with Balderstone St Leonard, Mellor St Mary and Samlesbury St Leonard, and under God seek to build a new worshipping community which both creates something new and at the same time values and honours the present life, the history and the faithful witness over the centuries of all three parishes. As Jesus tells us those "who have been trained for the kingdom of heaven are like...a household who bring out of their treasure what is new and old' [Matthew 13,52]. But of course, the building up of the United Benefice is not for our benefit it is in order that we may be witnesses and disciples who are seeking to fulfil our Lord's commandment to "go and make disciples of all nations" [Matthew 28,19]. And as a previous Archbishop of Canterbury William Temple (1881-1944) once commented: "Church is the only society on earth that exists for the benefit of non-members".

And that of course is what makes it a daunting prospect. How are we as a United Benefice going to go about fulfilling our mission and ministry in order to 'make disciples' perhaps not of all nations but most certainly of the world and society in which we are placed? There is no simple answer to that question; and certainly no timescales, for it is only in the journeying that we will begin to see what it is that God is calling us to be and to do. What we can say is that it will be the task of us all and not just a few for it is only together as the Body of Christ are we be able to fulfil our call to be the People of God in this place. As St Paul reminds us: "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body..." [1Corinthians 12].

So, it's exciting and daunting at the same time but that's what our Christian pilgrimage is all about for our task is to work, not for the world or even for the church, but for the Kingdom of God.

"You found out what we were doing and you interfered: 'Come and do it with me', you said.

So thank you, Lord, for interfering in our lives.

You promised us nothing by way of success, recognition, possessions or reward, 'These things will come at the right time when you walk with me,' you said.

So thank you, Lord, for promising us nothing.

You gave us no resources apart from ourselves – hands meant for caring, lips meant for praising, hearts meant for loving, and the Holy Spirit to make us restless until we change.

So thank you, Lord, for the essential gifts.

Then, just when we've got it right as to where we should go and what we should do, just when we're ready to take on the world, you come, like a beggar to our back door, saying 'This is the way, I am the Way.'

So thank you, Lord, for coming again and keeping us right, and showing you care for us and for all people."
